





Previously he worked as a reporter, bureau chief, and columnist at newspapers in Michigan and Florida. His work has won numerous awards, including the National Press Club's Consumer Journalism Award. Marley quickly grew into a barrel-

ing, ninety-sevenpound steamroller of a Labrador Retriever, a dog like no other. He crashed through screen doors, gouged through drywall, flung drool on guests, stole

women's undergarments, and ate nearly everything he could get his mouth around, including couches and fine jewelry. Obedience school did no good — Marley was expelled. Neither did the tranquilizers the veterinarian prescribed for him with the admonishment, "Don't hesitate to use these."


Tickets for John Grogan's author presentation are free and are available at all Mesa County Libraries' branches.

One Book, I About One Book, One Mesa County

One Book, One Mesa County encourages everyone in the community to read and discuss the same book. All are invited to a variety of book events.

One Book, One Mesa County is a community wide reading project brought to you by Mesa County Libraries, Colorado Humanities, The Daily Sentinel, KREX, the City of Grand Junction, CWOA, Inc., and American National Bank. It is modeled after a one book/one community project that started in Seattle in 1998. They have been wildly successful in hundreds of communities across the nation over the past eight years.

Here's how it works: Everyone reads the same

book at the same time and we come together to discuss it and celebrate it with special events. We have chosen Marley & Me as the book for 2007.

The late Washington Post writer Mary Mc-Grory described the purpose beautifully: "The idea is that the community that opens the same book closes it in greater harmony."

- Improves literacy
- · Involves our children, as well as adults
- · Is cross-cultural and reaches every economic household
- Heightens community spirit
