"Stray Dog," a documentary film about a motorcycle-riding Vietnam veteran, will be shown at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 21, at the Mesa County Libraries Central Library, 443 N. 6th St. in Grand Junction.

"Stray Dog" is directed by Debra Granik, the Oscar-nominated director of "Winter's Bone." "Stray Dog" tells the story of Ronnie "Stray Dog" Hall, a Vietnam veteran. Behind the tattoos and leather vest is a man dedicated to helping his fellow vets and immigrant family as he comes to terms with his combat experience.

The film screening will be preceded by a reception at 6 p.m., and it will be followed by a panel discussion. It is open to the public at no charge. Parking is available in the East Lot of the Central Library, just off Sixth and Grand.

"Stray Dog" is part of the Indie Lens Pop-Up film series, sponsored by Mesa County Libraries, Rocky Mountain PBS, Talon Wines, and No Coast Sushi. Indie Lens Pop-Up, formerly known as Community Cinema, embraces the same tradition of entertaining and enlightening local residents by bringing expert panels and average citizens together in an inviting atmosphere to discuss issues of vital importance to today's world.

The Friends of the Mesa County Libraries is a nonprofit organization that has provided support for programs at Mesa County Libraries for nearly 50 years.

Programs funded by the Friends include the Summer Reading Program; One Book, One Mesa County; Poetry Night; and Literacy. The Friends have provided funds for various projects at the Fruita and Palisade branch libraries and contributed \$100,000 to the recent Central Library Expansion and Improvement Project. In addition to twice-yearly book sales, Friends operates the Novel Idea Bookstore in the Central Library.

To participate in "1,000 Books Before Kindergarten," parents need only visit any Mesa County Libraries location to register online and pick up an attractive logbook in which they can record the titles

of all 1,000 books they read with their child. Special incentives will be offered for reaching milestones along the way, and upon completion, children receive a book. There is no charge to participate.

Rosetta Stone language-learning software available for use by Mesa County Libraries patrons

Rosetta Stone, a leading languagelearning software product, is now available for online use by Mesa County Libraries cardholders on any Internetconnected computer.

Rosetta Stone offers self-paced, interactive instruction in 30 languages, including Spanish, Russian, Japanese, German, French, Mandarin, Swahili, and English.

It is available to library patrons at no charge via Internet-connected computers as well as mobile web devices using iPhone/iPad and Android operating systems.

Patrons can expect lessons designed to build reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills through activities that focus on grammar, vocabulary, and pronunciation. Language instruction is available for various skill levels, from beginner to advanced users. Users interested in Rosetta Stone may find it by clicking here and then scrolling down to "Rosetta Stone." Users may sign in with an active email address and their library card number.

Mesa County Libraries have offered Rosetta Stone as a languagelearning option for several years in the Central Library's Language Lab. Because of the product's popularity, the library decided to expand its availability to library patrons via any Internet-connected computer or mobile device.

"This is a great opportunity for anyone wanting to learn a language to use one of the most highly regarded learning tools available," said Shana Wade, associate director of Mesa County Libraries. "We are proud to make Rosetta Stone available to our patrons and invite all language learners to give it a try."
