2	• Dow moved to approve the agenda via acclamation. None opposed, Motion

	Community Needs Assessment
	• Schonhoff presented the results of the Mesa County Libraries Community Needs
	Assessment. He covered research questions driving the project, comparisons with similar library service areas, forecasted growth, other statistics, and summarized
	the key findings and recommendations from the survey.
	 Gathered feedback on the library and library services from community members
	through a survey, focus groups and interviews.
	• 2,468 survey responses
	• 29 focus group participants
	8 interviews with Spanish-speaking members of the community.
	• The feedback was generally very positive and highlighted staff and
3	services.
	• Are the current locations enough for the communities?
	• Fruita and Orchard Mesa
	 Orchard Mesa Branch has a smaller location for its population. It has fewer visits than the Palisade branch despite serving more
	people. The branch size for Orchard Mesa is smaller than Palisade
	as well.
	 58% of patrons in Orchard Mesa zipcode identified Central library
	as home library. Some constructive feedback was received on the
	size of the branch and offerings.
	 Key considerations for a new Orchard Mesa Branch locations are
	to be roughly equidistant from Central and Clifton Library
	locations, have space for events and studying, provide

	opportunities to partner and create a community hub, and have
	accessible building and available parking.
	• Fruita Library has to contend with other programs in the same building
	such as swim classes that puts stress on available parking.
	• The community in Fruita desires more space due to the popularity of
	programs such as adult craft classes.
	• Parking is often an issue.
	• Where should our libraries be located to best serve those who would benefit from
	library services?
	 Anything falling within a 40 minute walk (approximately 2 miles) was close to a library location. About 43% of Mesa County residents live
	within that walking distance of the library. 73% live within a 10 minute
	drive of the library. They're distanced fairly well from each other to
	maximize people being served.
	• Are there alternative ways to serve our most rural communities with lower
	populations other than a library location?
	• What have other libraries done? Where in the county are the rural
	communities most underserved?
	The most populated rural communities with no library location are
	Mack and Loma. Most patrons from these regions identified the
	Fruita Branch as their home library.
	 Some ideas were smart lockers and book vending machines, and a
	self-service library model.
	• What amenities do residents of Mesa County want or need?
	• Increased capacity for Fruita Branch
	• A new location for Orchard Mesa Branch
	• Alternative service models to reach rural populations
	 More community room space
	• More programming for adults
	 Increased parking at Central
	 Improving the website, particularly around mobile device usage
